Club Wax Dipper


Many beekeepers particularly new members may be unaware that the Club owns a custom-built wax dipper. Basically, this is a giant electric steel vat in which three honey boxes or supers are simultaneously submerged in hot paraffin wax for several minutes. The wax is heated to about 150-160 degrees which takes several hours therefore to be economically viable the Club needs at least 10-20 boxes to be dipped at a time. Boxes must be dry before dipping otherwise violent frothing and spilling of the wax results with potentially disastrous consequences.

Wax dipping is one of the best means of preserving hive boxes and boxes should last for years even in high-rainfall areas. Boxes can be used on hives immediately after dipping and provide a natural wood-grain look in the garden however painting the boxes after dipping provides better protection from sun damage. Boxes can be painted immediately while wax is cooling (therefore the wet paint is drawn into the wood) or after the wax has cooled and dried.

Because wax dipping can be hazardous and therefore better suited to a rural environment, the Club's wax dipper is managed by John Randall, 216 South Karori Road, Karori and all dipping must be pre-arranged (Phone 476-9959). Cost is \$5 per box and should be paid in cash direct to John at time of dipping or on collection of box/es. Boxes should be labelled on the inside with felt-tip pen with beekeepers name and phone number.

Boxes for dipping must be brand new. However, used boxes will be accepted provided these boxes (or hive parts) are fully scraped of beeswax and propolis and are delivered to John fully enclosed in black plastic rubbish sacks to prevent any risk of contamination or attracting local bees. AFB disease contaminated boxes are NOT accepted. These MUST be destroyed by beekeepers in terms of the AFB PMS regulations.

It is the Club's intention to have at least one or two dipping sessions in the spring and early summer when hive-ware is usually assembled or repaired prior to establishment of new colonies or seasonal supering-up. These dates will be circulated to all members via the club newsletter and at club meetings.
